First r Prove that if from the same point in a perpendicdivision ular to a line, two oblique lines are drawn cutting off unequal distances from the foot of the perpendicular, the line cutting off the greater distance is the greater.

2 Prove that in the same circle or in equal circles, equal central angles intercept equal arcs; and of two unequal cen-

tral angles the greater intercepts the greater arc.

3 Complete and demonstrate the following: if a straight line

divides two sides of a triangle proportionally . . .

4 Complete and demonstrate the following: if from a point without a circle a secant and a tangent are drawn . . .

5 Prove that if a circumference is divided into any number of equal arcs, the chords joining the successive points of division form a regular inscribed polygon.

Second 6 In a trapezoid the bases are 5 inches and 8 inches, division the legs 4 inches and 6 inches respectively; how far must each of the legs be produced that they may meet at a point?

7 The perpendicular distance between two parallel sides of

a regular hexagon is d; find the area of the hexagon.

8 The angles A, B and C of a triangle inscribed in a circle are respectively 74°, 50° and 56°; BC produced meets the tangent AD at D. Find each of the angles of the triangle ABD.

9 The sides of a triangle are respectively 4 inches, 9 inches and 12 inches; find how far the shortest side must be produced to meet the bisector of the exterior angle of the opposite vertex.

To The radius of a circle is 2 inches; find the area of the segment cut off by a chord equal to the side of the inscribed equilateral triangle.

Third 11 Show how to construct a right triangle when the division segments of the hypotenuse made by the bisector of the right angle are given.

12 Show how to construct a trapezoid when the four sides

are given.

13 Prove that in a parallelogram perpendiculars to the same diagonal from opposite vertices are equal.

14 Prove that if two equal chords of a circle intersect, their corresponding segments are equal.

15 Prove that the diagonals of a rhombus are unequal
